The Councilor suggests that staff will reduce parking in the north end of the park. But doing so demonstrates yet another lose-lose aspect of the City's park plan. Removing parking near Bonaccord Street will worsen the overflow parking issue on Bonaccord, for which the community has been asking the City since 2022 without success for traffic calming treatment because of the high number of children using the playground and splash pad in Hamilton Park. So the choice is either more unusable parking area in the park, or bigger traffic and safety issues on Bonaccord and nearby streets.
